



Project Overview

The new \$20.7 million Cambie Fire Hall No. 3 and Richmond North Ambulance Station replaced the 59 year-old Bridgeport Fire Hall and adjacent B.C. Ambulance Service Station. The building is the first facility in a major B.C. city that has combined Fire and Ambulance services in one building.

Locating the two agencies in a single purpose-built facility and co-sharing of some common spaces, provides a number of operational and financial efficiencies. In addition, it provides the potential for joint training activities to further strengthen collaboration and the working relationship between our two agencies.

Key Features

- The 26,000 ft² facility is sustainably designed to meet Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design (LEED) Gold standards and will be post-disaster rated to ensure it remains operable in an emergency.
- Four apparatus bay folding doors which open horizontally are the first of its kind in British Columbia providing faster response time.
- Onsite training facility with classrooms and outdoor areas for Auto Extrication, Yard Drills, foam detention tank, training hydrants & concrete spray wall.
- Specialized mechanic shop where Emergency Vehicle Technicians maintain all the Fire-Rescue fleet vehicles.
- The B.C. Ambulance station provides covered space for six ambulances, as well as storage, and crew quarters for paramedics to review training materials and do paperwork between calls.
